

"Violinist at the window", 1861


by Otto Franz Scholderer and Noemi Triulcio

Mona Lisa by Leonardo da Vinci and David Hapciuk




I chose it because I like this picture.

Very little is known about Vermeer's life.



To re-create this painting I used a white shirt and a black elegant jacket from my dad and the red belt from my mother's dressing gown as a tie. Having no apples at home, I colored an orange green and with the wire and tissue paper I created the leaves. I drew the bowler hat on a black cardboard, then I cut it out and stuck it on the forehead with scotch tape. With a spoon I kept the apple in front of the face to make the effect of levitation. Behind me my brother kept a cloth in order to make the background of a homogeneous color. Together with my dad I used Photoshop to put the original background of the painting as the background of my photo.

To recreate it I used a bottle of wine, a glass and a white shirt.

By Raphaelle Peale and Diana Ene





To recreate it I used a black background, two glasses, four lemons, four nuts and a bowl of raisins. I put the two glasses behind the bowl with near them the nuts and the raisins and in the foreground we can see the bowl with the raisins and three lemons above it, finally I put the fourth lemon next to it.

I am not really proud of it because I didn't have oranges at home and the lemons didn't have the leaves but at the end it's not really bad because after all everything fits well enough.

By Vincent Van Gogh and Giulia De sio






I choose it because I have always liked Van Gogh's works very much, and this one was nice to recreate.
